Homily 6th December 2020 – 2nd Sunday of Advent, Year B

Dear friends, in the First Reading we hear a message of hope and consolation addressed to the exiles in Babylon. It would appear that there was little ground for hope, however, the Prophet Isaiah assures his people that God is about to come to their aid and will lead them back to their own land in a new exodus. Even though the actual return from exile fell far short of the glowing picture painted here, Isaiah's words point the way to the messianic era.

The first reading leads us into the Gospel. John appears in the desert and announces the coming of Jesus, the Christ and Son of God, two titles with which Mark begins his Gospel. Both readings issue a call for repentance with an invitation to "Prepare a way for the Lord."

The message that rings out loud and clear on this second Sunday of Advent, is heard in both the First Reading and the Gospel; "Prepare a way for the Lord....make his paths straight..."

Mark's gospel begins in the wilderness with a voice crying out to be heard. We are introduced to a man named John. The wild man of the desert who draws the Jewish crowds to him and challenges them. John was the last and greatest of the prophets who prepared the people for the coming of the Messiah. For a while he dominated the scene, he was the link between the Old and New, he enjoyed great popularity but was always very conscious of the fact someone greater than he was coming and his role was simply to prepare people.

When Jesus appeared John knew that his task was complete, his job was done. He didn't stand in Jesus' way, he pointed him out, acknowledging that Jesus was the one that they had been waiting for and then he stepped aside allowing Jesus to take over; once Jesus appeared John was quite happy to take a backward step.

There is something very attractive about John the Baptist, people listened to him, and subsequently changed their lives. In the midst of his eccentricity he had integrity and he spoke the truth which challenged people to repentance, to conversion and a new way of living.

On this second Sunday of Advent we too are challenged by a voice that cries in the wilderness, "Prepare a way for the Lord, and make his paths straight..."

As we are challenged by that wilderness voice today, how are we going to respond this Advent?"

Homily 6th December 2020 – 2nd Sunday of Advent, Year B

Last Sunday in his homily Pope Francis said that Advent is the season for 'remembering the closeness of God who came down to dwell in our midst,' and he encouraged people to pray the traditional Advent prayer, 'Come, Lord Jesus' every day. He said that Advent is both a time of 'God's closeness and our watchfulness.'

As we prepare a way for the Lord this Advent let's follow Pope Francis' advice and pray together that simple Advent prayer, *Come, Lord Jesus, come into my heart and life afresh and anew.*
